

Download Mono-ha: School Of Things

Some noticings by Jon Nicholls, Director of Arts & Creativity at Thomas Tallis School. The title of this blog comes from the Japanese art movement 'Mono Ha' which roughly translates as 'School of...'. These are the characters in the anime and manga series Doraemon. Also listed are their original NTV voice actors (1973), followed by their TV Asahi voice actors (1979~2005; 2005~). Part of the 22nd century characters are listed in The Doraemons.. Note: In some translations of Doraemon, the names of these characters are different from the original names. Lee Ufan was one of the leading figures of the Mono-ha school (School of Things), a contemporary art movement emerging in the late 1960s. Lee's works in the museum include two-dimensional paintings featuring repetitive brushstrokes laid down with the rhythm of quiet breathing and sculptures that organically combine stones and steel plates, in which the artist's interventions are reduced to the ...
